

Pupil Premium Strategy Statement: Raleigh School



In addition to the provision outlined in this document we provide each Pupil Premium child with individualised specific support based on their needs and measure the impact of this using the 'RAG' rating scheme as can be seen on our impact tracker. The Pupil Premium strategy at the Raleigh is to raise the expectations and life chances for Pupil Premium children by implementing a bespoke individual offer, with academic subjects taking priority.
